Confirmation of the previous minutes from the 2020 AGM meeting held on 26 September 2020 be passed.



Motion: Nick Harwood to be elected as the Treasurer for the Governors Bay Jetty Restoration Trust for 2021/2022


Passed: All members present agreed with no objections

The meeting was closed by the new chair, Prue Miller. at 17:17


Chairperson's report

Thank you all for coming.

Here is a summary of what we have achieved in the last financial year:

- Applied for and was granted building consent
- Heritage inspection of the jetty
- Jetty supporters meeting to discuss fundraising in Covid environment (via Zoom)
- Developed jetty Board game
- Meeting with Lyttelton Port Company engineers for their feedback on the consented design
- Visited John Fairweather's sawmill to review progress and quality of jetty forest timber milling
- Met with the fundraising team at Cholmondeley Children's Centre to discuss combined
- fundraisers
- Held a design review meeting for Trustees to give feedback and make decisions on jetty
- Instructed John Fairweather to mill 8 test stringers
- Were co-organisers of Governors Bay Fete, in collaboration with Governors Bay Community
- Association
- Gathered the entrance fee at Waitahuna's Vintage Collective event
- Printed a 2021 fundraising calendar
- Gave a presentation about the jetty to Lyttelton Rotary Club
- Held a working bee and removed the handrails from the jetty to be repurposed or sold as a
- fundraiser







Held a fundraising golf day

Thank you for your time your work and your financial contribution extending now over 6 years. Tenders are in. Over the next four weeks, we will complete the process selecting the contractor to carry out the rebuild. In the meantime, there is a high degree of commercial sensitivity. We are currently not in a position to disclose who are the final tenderers or their proposals.

We can say the tenders are in accordance with our expectations. We can work with them, and it is our expectation we will enter into an agreement by the beginning of November to rebuild the jetty, everything going to plan.

During October we want to gain a good understanding of what we can expect to recover by way of donations sales and events over the next 9 months. The Trust should gain a better understanding of what can come from business sponsorship and grants and most importantly support from Christchurch.

An important point to make is that the greater the ability to commit funds for the entire project now rather than later will result in saving a significant sum that we won't have to fundraise for. The month of October is accordingly a very important period where we seek funds and obtain commitments. There will be a great number of tasks we need people to help carry out. It is not about always asking for money, nor should it impose a burden in time. Find out by asking the trustees what you can do to help.

We recognise the challenging times we live in. There is competition for donations and from recent experiences, raising funds close to home. We have, however, important points of difference that will attract support. Our key messages:

- The "Jetty", seen alongside Brighton Pier and Akaroa Wharf. A destination in its own right, its own character, its own name.
- The community, from head of the harbour and surrounding hills, have for six years worked with the goal of restoring the jetty and now, take on relocating the Boat House. They deserve support.
- From a city-wide perspective, the jetty is the first point of entry into what might be described
 as the "blue Hagley Park"; the colours blue and green reflecting the city's National Park status.
 But in this case, a park largely devoid of young people enjoying paddle boarding and kayaking
- The peninsula; our city's point of difference. The jetty is the catalyst, seeking widespread support, highlighting opportunities.
- Recreation, particularly for young people through schools and youth organisations.


Compare the original estimated cost of the rebuild \$7.8 million (in 2015 before the Trust became involved) against what we have received tenders for. We have totally smashed the "value proposition". The Trust demonstrates what can be achieved by a small, dedicated groups of volunteers.

Treasurer's report

This report covers the period from April 2020 to March 2021. Our financial statements were compiled by Community Capacity Accounting. They are also doing a financial audit for us.

Total income was \$64,158. This includes:





- Donations, including plank sponsors: \$29,008
- Events (2020 music festival, Governors Bay Fete, and the golf day): \$11,148
- Sale of Gladstone Wharf piles (donated by Lyttelton Port Company) first half of payment: \$16,250
- Sale of merchandise: \$6,264Interest from the bank: \$1712

Total expenditure was \$9,318. This went to pay:

- Project costs, including the jetty forest timber: \$136,624 (including GST)
- Fundraising costs (purchase of merchandise, events expenses): \$6,438
- Operating costs (bank fees, web hosting, accounting fees): \$2,700

Funds secured, but not in the bank yet:

- Grant to come from Stout Trust when construction starts: \$20,000
- Further funding from CCC in 2020/21 year: \$350,000
- Plank sponsors who will donate once we start the rebuild: \$1000
